
The Charlotte Action Research Project




Mission

CHARP History and Structure



Neighborhood Context Continuum



Goal	Graham Heights	Windy Ridge	
Organizational Capacity	CHARP model is working- major uptick in enthusiasm for organizing; emergence of new leaders	Lack of interest in organizing; role of Homeowner's Association; transiency	
Physical improvements	Small scale beautification projects have generated excitement	"Band aid" projects serve to "satisfy" instead of addressing larger scale issues of spatial injustice	
Social Capital	Success in bringing together renters/owners.	Distrust and isolation.	
Research/Spatial Justice	More difficult to implement in the short-run but possible with time; plethora of viable community partners.	Plenty of research projects; difficult to identify viable partners in the community.


"Nobody knows what we're supposed to be doing or what resources we have."

Reid Park Context

- Developed in 1930s
 exclusively for
 Charlotte's African
 American population;
- History of organizing in late 1980s and 1990s
- Neighborhood
 Improvement Plan (NIP)



Humble Beginnings

- 2009 Workshop Class
- A neighborhood where "people just don't want to be engaged"
- Identified strong sense of pride and sense of attachment
